
A leader in student activities, Lance and some of his classmates addressed Borough Council on the problem, asking help to clean the tunnel.

They learned that the borough could not accept the responsibility, since the tunnel is property of the Montour Railroad.

But, despite objections from the railroad, concerned about possible damage suits, Bethel Manager Ralph Bowen agreed to let the youths have their way.

Young Kirby, who lives at 3655. Maplevue Dr.. Bethel Park, told council he and his friends would paint the tunnel-to get rid of "that image."

Father Provided Paint

His father, Albert, provided 19 gallons of paint at a cost of more than \$100, the Bethel Junior Chamber of Commerce helped out and in four hours last Saturday the tunnel was clean again.

Both faces and 10 feet of the walls from the road up were given a fresh coat of battleship gray.

But the paint was just dry when the vandals returned with their buckets and brushes early yesterday.

They wanted to be cute again, but again revealed the amount of their intelligence by spelling "paint" without an "n."

Police To Investigate

Mayor Page ordered the police to investigate the matter.

This time borough officials may find out who has been marking up the tunnel, because police were called by several people who witnessed the pranks early yesterday.

The mayor said he arranged for a \$30 reward "through some of my friends" for information leading to the culprits.

Mayor Page also said he would press vandalism charges against the suspects once they are caught, while attempting to force the youths to repaint the tunnel at their own expense.

"I think their parents would co-operate with us," Mayor Page said.
